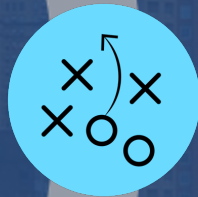
INSIGHT RECOMMENDATION

GOAL

- Make changes to programs that influence daily operations to reduce the city's overall climate impact



PATH TO ACTION

- Create program data around which communication and understanding can happen
- Build budget requests utilizing program data to ensure changes are enacted



SKILLS AND CAPACITY

- Create the shared language complete with all the program data
- Invite the knowledge base within the organization to ideate on those programs and make recommendations

CLIMATE

Resource scarcity and organizational constraints make it difficult to address "new" issues such as Climate Action. But local governments have a unique opportunity to prepare for the impacts of climate change.

HOMELESSNESS, OPIOID CRISIS, FAILING INFRASTRUCTURE...

EQUITY

By establishing a clear equity mission and goals local governments will enter a new era of citizen-focused governance with an equity focus.



COVID RECOVERY

With the American Rescue Plan Act funds providing a massive funding allocation, the way you spend your funds has the potential to impact your community for years to come.



FISCAL SUSTAINABILITY

With no plausible future ahead where local government has all the resources needed to make a high magnitude of reallocation ordinary and regularly achievable.



BUDGETING FOR EQUITY

CITY OF TACOMA, WA

- Clear definition for equity objective with many measurable components
- Requests coming in disconnected from this outcome
- OMB went back to departments with an “appreciative inquiry exercise”
- Modified requests and proposals to move the needle on equity objective

FISCAL SUSTAINABILITY

THE CITY OF DULUTH

BEFORE

Line-item budget with no flexibility for new initiatives or new hires

“Same old, same old” fashion—a deficit meant positions were held vacant

Voluntary cuts or across the board cuts

AFTER

Aligned resources with comprehensive plan

Pivoted to program-based budgeting strategy to determine budget cuts

Shrunk budget gap and ensured success of Imagine Duluth 2035 plan



HOMELESSNESS

In Kalamazoo, MI

Goal: End homelessness and hunger instead of funding homeless shelters and food pantries.

CREDIT RATING

In Scott County, MN

Goal: Incorporate strong revenue and expenditure assumptions in the budget.

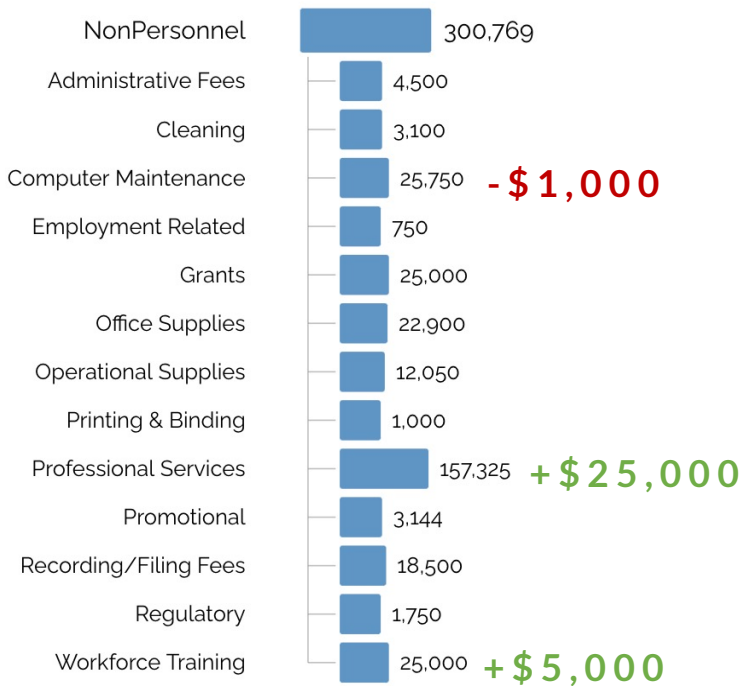

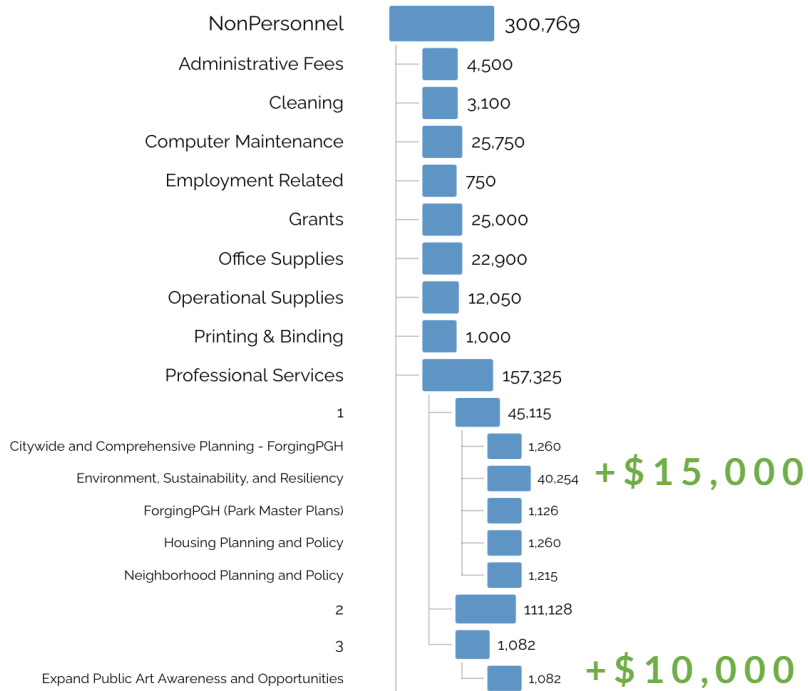

FUELING RESOURCES TOWARDS RESULTS

DEMONSTRATE INVESTMENT INTO STRATEGIC PLAN

- Decisions are made based on increased impact (budget decisions and other programmatic decisions)

DEMONSTRATE REALLOCATION OF RESOURCES TO FUND NEW PROGRAMS IN ALIGNMENT WITH NEW RESULTS

- Rate, fee increase, correlated to recovering true cost of doing business
- Entrepreneurially insourcing services to increase revenue

DEMONSTRATE REALLOCATION OF RESOURCES TO NEW ENDEAVORS

- Enhance service levels with clear intent on outcomes
- Launch new programs with clear intent on outcomes
